CAN / CAN'T / COULD / COULDN'T

Modal Verbs

CAN

The three main uses of **Can** are: 1) ability 2) possibility and 3) permission. However, there are some other uses of **Can** as we will see below.

To express ability

Can means to be (physically) able to do something OR to know how to do something.

- Birds can fly.
- Elephants can't fly.

To ask for or give permission / To request something

Can is used to ask for / request permission or to give permission.

Note: Can't is used to refuse permission.

- You can use my umbrella; I don't need it right now.
- Can I sit in that chair please?

COULD

Could is similar to Can and often replaces Can in the past tense (though not always).

To express ability in the past

- I could ride a horse when I was younger but now I can't.
- She could juggle eight balls when she was only 10 years old.

Polite word used to ask for permission or to request something (in the present)

- Could I please use your bathroom?
- Could we move on to the next topic now please?

Couldn't: Sure that something is untrue

Just like can't, you can use couldn't when you are sure that something isn't true or real.

- That **couldn't** be my cat meowing outside, it was hit by a car last week.
- He couldn't have painted that. He has no artistic ability at all.
