

QUANTIFIERS: MUCH, MANY, A LOT, A FEW, A LITTLE

A quantifier is a word or phrase which is used before a noun to indicate the amount or quantity.

Some, many, a lot of and *a few* are examples of quantifiers.

It is important to note what kind of nouns we are trying to quantify: **count** or **uncount** nouns.

Examples:

- There are **some** books on the table.
- She's only got **a few** t-shirts.
- How **much** bread should I buy?
- He has **many** concerns about his future.
