



Zero Conditional / If + Simple Present

These kinds of sentences express general truths, something that always happens under certain conditions. They contain two clauses, both in simple present. It doesn't matter which one comes first.

A Zero Conditional sentence is formed of two clauses, an **“if”** clause and a **main** clause.

“If” clause + simple present

Main cause + simple present

Zero Conditional / If + Simple Present

“If” clause

- If it rains,
- If you freeze

Main clause

- the grass gets wet.
- it turns into ice.

Main clause

- The grass gets wet
- Water turns into ice

“If” clause

- If it rains.
- If you freez it.

***If the “if” clause comes first, a comma is usually used.
If the “if” clause comes second, there is no coma.***
