GLOSSARY

Achieve: to <u>succeed</u> in <u>finishing</u> something or <u>reaching</u> an <u>aim</u>, <u>especially</u> after a lot of <u>work</u> or <u>effort</u>.

Countless: very many, or too many to be counted

Environment: the <u>conditions</u> that you <u>live</u> or <u>work</u> in and the way that they <u>influence</u> how you <u>feel</u> or how <u>effectively</u> you can <u>work</u>

Feedback: <u>information</u> or <u>statements</u> of <u>opinion</u> about something, such as a new <u>product</u>, that can <u>tell</u> you if it is <u>successful</u> or <u>liked</u>

Outstanding: <u>clearly</u> very much <u>better</u> than what is <u>usual</u>

Scenarios: a description of possible actions or events in the future

Parameters: a set of <u>facts</u> or a <u>fixed limit</u> that <u>establishes</u> or <u>limits</u> how something can or must <u>happen</u> or be done.

Innovation: (the use of) a new idea or method

Improvement: an <u>occasion</u> when something gets <u>better</u> or when you make it <u>better</u>

Measures: to discover the exact size or amount of something

Mapping: the <u>activity</u> or <u>process</u> of making a <u>map</u>.

Diagrams: a <u>simple plan</u> that <u>represents</u> a <u>machine</u>, <u>system</u>, or <u>idea</u>, etc., often <u>drawn</u> to <u>explain</u> how it <u>works</u>

Bottlenecks: a <u>place</u> where a <u>road becomes narrow</u>, or a <u>place</u> where there is often a lot of <u>traffic</u>, <u>causing</u> the <u>traffic</u> to <u>slow</u> down or <u>stop</u>

Stakeholders:a person such as an employee, customer, or citizen whois involved withan organization, society, etc.And therefore has responsibilities towards it and an interest in its success

GLOSSARY

Consensus: a <u>generally</u> <u>accepted</u> <u>opinion</u> or <u>decision</u> among a <u>group</u> of <u>people</u>

Democratically: in a way that is <u>based</u> on the <u>wishes</u> of most of the <u>people</u>

Hypotheses: a proposition, or set of propositions, set forth as an explanation for the occurrence of some specified group of phenomena, either asserted merely as a provisional conjecture to guide investigation (working hypothesis) or accepted as highly probable in the light of established facts.

Phenomena: a plural of phenomenon.

Phenomenon: a fact, occurrence, or circumstance observed or observable.

Empirical: provable or verifiable by experience or experiment

Theoretical: of, relating to, or consisting in <u>theory</u>; not practical (distinguished from <u>applied</u>).

Mainstay: a person or thing that acts as a chief support or part

Dialectical: of or characteristic of a dialect.

Categorical: without exceptions or conditions; absolute; unqualified and unconditional

Ranking: occupying a specific <u>rank</u>, position, etc. (often used in combination)

Flaw: a feature that mars the perfection of something; defect; fault:

<u>Scope</u>: space for movement or activity; opportunity for operation.

Entrepreneurship: a person who organizes and manages any enterprise, especially a business, usually with considerable initiative and risk.

Ambiguity: an unclear, indefinite, or equivocal word, expression, meaning, etc

Shortages: the amount of such deficiency

Attributes: something attributed as belonging to a person, thing, group, etc.; a quality, character, characteristic, or property.

Decrease: the act or process of <u>decreasing</u>; condition of being decreased; gradual reduction

Interdisciplinary: combining or involving two or more professions, technologies, departments, or the like, as in business or industry.

Prototype: the original or model on which something is based or formed.

Feasibility: probable; likely:

Venture: a business enterprise or speculation in which something is risked in the hope of profit; a commercial or other speculation:

Reengineering: to engineer anew

Budget: an estimate, often itemized, of expected income and expense for a given period in the future.
