
## Talking About the Weather

Questions	Possible Answers
"What's the weather like?"	It's sunny. I like sunny days. I don't like when it's too hot.
"What's the temperature here?"	It's 25 degrees Celsius.
"Do you have rain?"	Usually in the month of May.
"Beautiful day, huh?"	Oh, yes, it is beautiful.
"How's the weather today?"	Today's weather is rainy.

Below is a list and images of the different types of weather you will likely use:

- It's cold today.
- It's drizzling (light rain).
- It's raining (the rain is falling).
- The wind is blowing.
- It's snowing.
- It's freezing outside.

- It's foggy today.
- It's hot and windy.
- It's raining.
- The sun is shining.
- It's sunny.

## Talking About the Seasons

There are four seasons in the year, and each season has its own type of weather:

### Spring:

- March to May.
- Flowers and trees grow.
- It's warm and sometimes rainy.
- Good time to eat al fresco.



<p><b>Summer:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– June to August.</li> <li>– Hot and sunny.</li> <li>– People wear shorts and sandals.</li> <li>– People go to the beach.</li> <li>– The schools are closed for the summer.</li> </ul>	
<p><b>Autumn (or fall)</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– September to November.</li> <li>– Leaves fall.</li> <li>– It's windy and cool.</li> <li>– The days begin to get shorter and cooler.</li> <li>– Students go back to school and university.</li> <li>– People start to wear warmer clothing.</li> </ul>	
<p><b>Winter</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– December to February.</li> <li>– Cold and snowy.</li> <li>– People wear jackets.</li> <li>– People drink hot drinks.</li> <li>– The days are very short and dark.</li> </ul>
