Did You Know It?

Check out these explanations!

Two of the most common uses of the word *can* are:

- To name a metal container usually shaped like a cylinder used to keep food, drinks, and other things. *e.g. Two cans of soda.*
- To express that we know how to do some activity (therefore <u>used</u> <u>before a verb</u>).
 e.g. He <u>can</u> <u>swim</u> well.

Could you find another use for the word *can*?

Remember Not all *nouns* end in *s* when they are used in plural form:

• These nouns are only added an *s* to be used in plural form. cat-cats brother-brothers time-times computer-computers

These nouns are added *es* to be used in plural form.
 bus-buses match-matches lunch-lunches circuses

• These nouns not necessarily end in *s* or es. ox-oxen person-people garlic-garlic woman-women For the following section, *You have talent*, it is useful to know the definition of *modal* to understand how to use *can*.

A *modal* is a special verb because it behaves differently from other verbs in English. As you advance in this section, you will learn how a modal includes certain grammatical properties that other ordinary verbs do not.

It is also necessary for you to know what an *adverb* is. An adverb normally <u>qualifies the meaning of another word</u>, like a verb or adjective. In this concrete case, adverbs answer the questions <u>how?</u> and <u>in what</u> <u>way?</u>
