## Have/Get + Indirect Objects

The following structures are also used to express that others do our activities.

The main difference is that in this case the person who does the activity is <u>mentioned</u> after *have* or *get*.

(indirect object)

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Using get requires:

(something)

Some examples: do my laundry

(indirect object)

get + (someone) + to + (verb in base form) +

get my sister to do my laundry

paint the classrooms get the students to paint the classrooms

bake the cake get Maria to bake the cake

cook my favorite food get my mother to cook my favorite food

make our copies get the boy to make our copies

(indirect object)

**Using** *have* **requires**: have + (someone) + (<del>to</del> verb\* in base form) + (something)

Some examples: do my laundry have my sister do my laundry

paint the classrooms have the students paint the classrooms

bake the cake have Maria bake the cake

cook my favorite food have my mother cook my favorite food

make our copies have the boy make our copies

\*Notice that the phrases with *have* do not require the word *to* before the verb.
