

Hope and Wish

We use *hope* to express that we desire something happens. With singular subjects *hope* ends in *-s* as other cases in Simple Present tense.

For example:

Subject + *hope(s)* + (Someone) + can/Simple Present verb + complement.

I *hope* I can pass all my exams.

I *hope* Gustavo can come to Saltillo.

Mom *hopes* I get excellent notes.

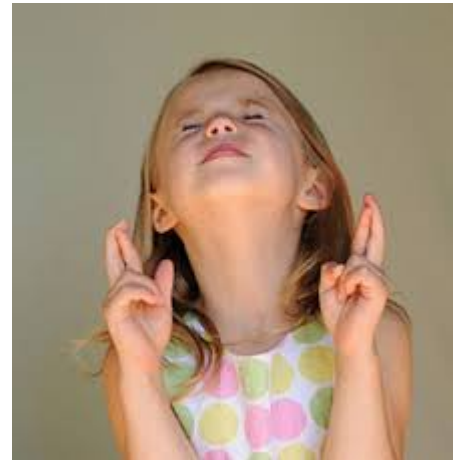
My cousins *hope* they can visit us this year.

Ivan *hopes* he gets the job.

He *hopes* Maria invites him to the party.

Everyone *hopes* it doesn't rain tomorrow.

Martha and Carlos *hope* the doctor tells them they will be parents.



Wish

We use *wish* to express we desire something were different.

For example:

Subject + *wish(es)* + (Someone) + Past Tense verb + complement.



Hope and Wish

I **wish** I **won** the lottery this year.

He **wishes** I **were** more organized.

They **wish** they **didn't have** a disobedient dog.

He **wishes** you **weren't** so selfish.

People **wish** they **had** more job opportunities.

Anna **wishes** John **stopped** smoking.
