Hope and Wish

We use *hope* to express that we <u>desire something happens</u>. With singular subjects *hope* ends in -s as other cases in Simple Present tense.

For example:

Subject + *hope*(s) + (Someone) + can/Simple Present verb + complement.

| hope | can pass all my exams.

I hope Gustavo can come to Saltillo.

Mom hopes | get excellent notes.

My cousins hope they can visit us this year.

lvan hopes he gets the job.

He hopes Maria invites him to the party.

Everyone hopes it doesn't rain tomorrow.

Martha and Carlos hope the doctor tells them they will be parents.

Wish

We use *wish* to express we <u>desire something were</u> <u>different</u>.

For example:

Subject + *wish*(es) + (Someone) + <u>Past Tense verb</u> + complement.





Hope and Wish

| wish | won the lottery this year.

He wishes I were more organized.

They wish they didn't have a disobbedient dog.

He wishes you weren't so selfish.

People wish they had more job opportunities.

Anna wishes John stopped smoking.
