

Past Perfect

We frequently use **Past Perfect** to express that one event in the past occurred preceding another event; for example, when we explain sequencing activities.



Martha's house was recently robbed.

Read Martha's narration of facts.

"It happened on Monday. I **left** home at 6:00pm as I usually do. My neighbors say they **heard** some noises coming from my house at around 7:00, but they didn't imagine the thieves **had entered** the house. When I **arrived** home at 10:00pm, they **had run** away. They **took** a bracelet and some money I **had left** on the table that day. Of course, I immediately **called** the police but they **arrived** until 1:00am! By the time they **arrived** I **had already fallen** asleep..."

Notice all of the verbs in the text express past time actions; nevertheless, they occurred in different moments of the past.

Some appear in **Simple Past** and other in **Past Perfect** tense (*had/n't* + a verb in past participle), which implies that one occurred before another one.

In the following examples, **the ideas in red** express more "antiquity" according to **the ideas in bold**, independently of the order they present.

Past Perfect

Note: remember that Past perfect ideas require the verb in past participle.

*When I **arrived** home, they **had run** away.*

*They **had run** away when I **arrived**.*

*By the time they **arrived** I **had already fallen** asleep.*

*I **had already fallen** asleep by the time they **arrived**.*
