### Was/Were

#### Was/Were Going To

Can you remember the structure *going to* for expressing future ideas?

The verb to be in present (*am*, *is* and *are* [*not*]) + *going to* is used to express <u>formal</u> or <u>decided</u> plans.

#### Take for example:

- I am going to start a French course tomorrow.
- Cindy is going to have another baby.
- Cesar and Octavio aren't going to continue studying law next year.

When we need to express the idea of <u>a frustrated plan</u> or a plan that was not taken into practice even when it was serious and formal, we use the same structure but we use the verb *to be* in past (*was/were* [*not*]).

Remember that the action verb must be used in base form.

### For example:

- I was going to study medicine but then I changed my mind.
- We were going to invite Jack and Alice but we did not have their phone number.
- Gael and Angie weren't going to have another baby but now they have three children.
- Samuel wasn't going to study dentistry. He convinced himself when he visited the university.
- She was going to get married, suddenly she just decided not to do it.
- The Christmas dinner wasn't going to be at Julio's house this year. They decided at the last moment.

## Was/Were

#### Was/Were + Planning/Supposed/Hoping

When we use the verb to be in past (was/were) + planning/supposed/hoping + <math>to, we infer that a plan or project will change.

In the three cases, these structures are followed by <u>a verb in base form</u>.

Look at the following examples with was/were + planning to:

- Today I was planning to wear sandals but it is too cold outside.
- Sally and Antonio were planning to <u>go</u> out to dinner together tonight but Antonio had to assist a job emergency.
- Our grandpa was planning to take a trip to Europe before he died.

These examples contain the structure was/were + supposed to:

- Anna and I were supposed to meet here at 3:00. It's 3:20 and she is not here yet!
- Rosie was supposed to <u>bake</u> the cake for Tommy's birthday but she has not even arrived.
- I was supposed to <u>have</u> three classes today but two of my teachers had to attend to an important school event.

# Was/Were

These examples contain the structure *was/were* + *supposed to*:

- We were hoping to take the class with Mr. Adams but his class is now full.
- Andrea was hoping to pass the admission test but it was extremely hard.
- Johnny and Pamela were hoping to buy a new car this year but they could not afford to buy it.
