Active Voice

Active voice is the grammatical construction, which is the common order of these three basic elements in a sentence:

Subject + verb phrase + object



e.g. The Thomsons wash their car.

People don't eat fast food.

Observe that these action verbs (wash, eat, sell) are in PRESENT TENSE, so...

Passive Voice is another way to order these three components, where the subject and object exchange their positions, and the verb phrase has to be expressed differently:

Object + verb phrase + by + Subject



e.g. Their car is washed by the Thomsons.

Fast food <u>isn't</u> eaten by people.

Computers <u>are</u> sold by me.

...in Passive voice, the verb to be is added in PRESENT TENSE too, + the action verb in past participle.

Active Voice

Notice! Passive voice is usually more formal than Active voice.

Check these examples

- 1. They use the computer every day. \rightarrow The computer is used by them everyday.
- 2. Humans invent many new things. > Many new things are invented by humans.
- 3. People don't buy expensive cell phones. → Expensive cell phones are not bought by people.
