English Grammar - Too & Enough

Form

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too + adjective/adverb

too much/many + noun

too much/many + of + pronoun/determiner

adjective/adverb + enough

enough + noun

enough + of + pronoun/determiner
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Meaning

- 1. Too is used to mean more than sufficient or more/less than necessary.
 - o It's **too late** to stop him.
 - Jerry was too young to watch the movie.
 - o There are **too many people** on this train, there's nowhere to sit.
 - o You have **too much money**, give some to me.
 - o You've eaten **too many of those** cakes.
- 2. *Enough* is used to mean sufficient.
 - o Your clothes are **big enough** to fit me.
 - You've done enough work. You can stop now.
 - Have you got enough money to buy me a drink?
- 3. *Enough* is used in negative sentences to mean less than sufficient or less than necessary.
 - You're not working fast enough, you won't finish on time.
 - Sorry, I haven't got enough food for everyone.
 - o Not **enough of my** friends are coming to the party.

Additional points

- 1. Enough can be used without a noun if the meaning is clear.
 - o There's a lot of food but not **enough** for everyone.

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- 2. Enough can be replaced with the before a noun.
 - o I don't have **the money** to go on holiday.
 - o His company doesn't have **the resources** to do the job.
- 3. Time or room can be used alone to mean enough time or enough room.
 - o Is there **room** in your car for one more person?
 - o Do we have **time** for a coffee?
